But we made the best of it and enjoyed shaking the lulav and etrog inside as we added poetry about nature and spoke about the timeless themes of Sukkot during our services. We will celebrate Simchat Torah during our Family service Friday October 5 followed by a potluck dinner. Please consider making flags to bring to services.
