After last January's MLK Day Interfaith Service at the Bay Area Unitarian Universalist Church, several clergy from our area were talking and realized that while there is a large Interfaith Council up in Houston, there was nothing like that in the Clear Lake Area. They contacted all those who'd been in attendance at the MLK Day service, TBT included, and in April held the first meeting of what has now become the Interfaith Council of Greater Clear Lake. The Council currently consists of over 12 faith communities in the Greater Clear Lake Area (including League City). Our mission statement is as follows:

"The Interfaith Council of Greater Clear Lake is a gathering of representatives of faith-based communities and individuals, dedicated to promoting respect, support, and understanding. We celebrate our spiritual and cultural diversity as we engage, partner, and respond to each other."

The group decided that the best way to introduce itself to the community would be to hold an event within the community that will bring people of different faiths together to learn about each other, discover what we have in common, and embrace and respect our differences. Probably every faith community has some form of "The Golden Rule" that they follow – essentially, to do unto others as you'd have them do to you. With that theme at the center, the Interfaith Council of Greater Clear Lake will hold their community kickoff Celebration of Living by the Golden Rule on Sunday, November 10th from 2:00-4:00pm at the League City Civic Center (400 West Walker St).
